1. What is the sweet substance made by bees: sap or honey?
2. **Answer:** Honey. The average honeybee will make 1/12 of a teaspoon of honey by the end of its lifespan.
3. During the Triassic, Jurassic, and Cretaceous periods, what type of animal roamed Earth: humans or dinosaurs?
Answer: Dinosaurs. The three periods make up the Mesozoic Era, which extends from when scientists believe dinosaurs first appeared to their extinction.
4. What color of rose symbolizes love: blue or red?
Answer: Red. Red roses are commonly given to significant others on Valentine's Day. Red carnations are apparently the second most popular.
5. What actress stars with Fred Astaire in the 1957 movie *Funny Face*: Bette Midler or Audrey Hepburn?
Answer: Audrey Hepburn. Hepburn plays a bookstore clerk turned fashion model in the movie.
6. What is the term for the bones around the chest that protect the heart and lungs: femurs or ribs?
Answer: Ribs. The ribs are shaped like a cage and attached with cartilage to a long, flat bone called the sternum in the center of the chest. The rib cage includes 24 ribs (two sets of 12).
7. What female painter is considered one of Mexico's greatest artists and is known for her many self-portraits like her painting "The Two Fridas": Grandma Moses or Frida Kahlo?
Answer: Frida Kahlo. She continues to be admired as a feminist icon.

7. In what city will you find the Empire State Building: London or New York?
Answer: New York. **Fun fact:** In a rare twist in the world of construction, the building came in under budget and went up in just over a year, well ahead of schedule.
8. What type of flower typically grows between five to 10 feet in height and is known for large heads of bright yellow petals and dark centers: lilac or sunflower?
Answer: Sunflower. **Fun fact:** In 2014, Hans-Peter Schiffer of Germany grew a sunflower that was 30 feet and one inch tall! It set a Guinness World Record at the time.
9. Lake Erie, Lake Superior, Lake Huron, and Lake Ontario are all found on the border of the United States and what country: France or Canada?
Answer: Canada. Lake Michigan is the only one of the five Great Lakes that doesn't touch Canada.
10. What is a baby kangaroo called: a cub or a joey?
Answer: A joey. There are over 40 species of kangaroos.

Answer: “Have a nice trip.” The term dates to the late 1600s.

Answer: Reaction. It is listed as the third law in Newton's laws of motion.

Answer: John F. Kennedy. She was known for her poise and excellent fashion sense. Five years after JFK's untimely death, she went on to marry Aristotle Onassis.
