(Questions with Answers)

1. What is the term for the long appendage that hangs from an elephant's face: snout or trunk?

Answer: Trunk. An elephant's trunk has roughly 40,000 muscles.

2. What sport did Lou Gehrig play: football or baseball?

Answer: Baseball. He played first base for the New York Yankees in the 1920s and '30s. Over his 15-year career with the team, the Yankees won six World Series titles.

3. In *The Wizard of Oz*, Dorothy and the Cowardly Lion fell asleep in a field of what kind of flowers: sunflowers or poppies?

Answer: Poppies. L. Frank Baum most likely chose poppies for his novel because opium is made from poppies and, at the time, it was often used as a sleep aid.

4. What do you call the person in charge of the government in Canada: president or prime minister?

Answer: Prime minister. To become prime minister in Canada, one doesn't have to be a certain age or born in Canada, but you do have to be a Canadian citizen.

5. What special doll in the 1960s could say things like "please take me with you": Barbie or Chatty Cathy?

Answer: Chatty Cathy. It had a pull string and 11 different phrases when first released. It was the first talking doll of its kind.

6. How many vowels are in the word *basket*: five or two?

Answer: Two. The word *basket* is believed to date back to the 13th century.

7. What are the two holes in your nose called: irises or nostrils?

Answer: Nostrils. Did you know a person's nose can change the temperature of the breath coming in so that it is easier on the throat and lungs?

8. What accessory keeps you dry in the rain: sunglasses or an umbrella?

Answer: Umbrella. The word *umbrella* comes from the Latin word *umbros*, meaning "shade" or "shadow."

9. The Three Stooges were named Larry, Moe, and what: Zeppo or Curly?

Answer: Curly. They began their careers as vaudeville performers.

10. What is another name for maize: tomatoes or corn?

Answer: Corn. In North America *corn* is primarily used, whereas *maize* is more commonly heard among British speakers.

11. In *Charlotte's Web*, what kind of creature is Charlotte: a bat or a spider?

Answer: A spider. In the story, she tries to save the life of a pig by writing kind things about him in her web.

12. The Sahara, Mojave (*moh-HAH-vay*), and Gobi are all what: oceans or deserts?

Answer: Deserts. Desert classification is sometimes determined by the amount of annual rainfall, temperature, humidity, or other factors. One-third of Earth's land surface is considered desert.

- 13. What do you call the party most people throw for women who are pregnant with their first child: stag party or baby shower? **Answer:** Baby shower. Though a common tradition in the U.S. and Canada, in some cultures it is bad luck to give gifts before the baby is born.
- 14. What famous boxer claimed to "float like a butterfly but sting like a bee": George Foreman or Muhammad Ali?
 Answer: Muhammad Ali. He successfully defended the world heavyweight championship title 19 times during his career. He was also the first boxer to win the championship on three separate occasions.
- 15. What song includes the line "When you hear the whistle blowing eight to the bar, Then you know that Tennessee is not very far": "Hound Dog" or "Chattanooga Choo Choo"?

 Answer: "Chattanooga Choo Choo." The song was recorded by the Glenn Miller Orchestra for the 1941 film *Sun Valley Serenade*.
