(Questions with Answers)

1. How many arms does an octopus have: three or eight?

Answer: Eight. The smallest known octopus is only two inches long, while the largest octopus species can grow to 18 feet in length with an arm span of nearly 30 feet.

2. Hoop, jump shot, court, and dribbling are all terms in what sport: golf or basketball?

Answer: Basketball. The sport was invented by James Naismith in the late 1800s when he was working at a YMCA in Massachusetts.

3. Where would you find a submarine: in the air or underwater?

Answer: Underwater. U.S. Navy submarines can submerge deeper than 800 feet and spend up to three months underwater.

4. What continent is Canada a part of: Asia or North America?

Answer: North America. The continent of North America includes 23 countries and over two dozen non-sovereign territories.

5. How many dwarves are in the fairy tale with Snow White: 15 or seven?

Answer: Seven. Originally a 19th-century German folktale, the story was published among many others in *Grimm's Fairy Tales* in 1812.

6. What small triangular item do you strum a guitar with: a cymbal or a pick?

Answer: Pick. Guitar picks have been around for centuries and have included everything from feather quills to tortoiseshells to the many options available today.

7. How many millimeters are in a centimeter: 77 or 10?

Answer: 10. A centimeter equals one-hundredth of a meter in the metric system, so a millimeter is one-thousandth of a meter.

8. What country is St. Patrick associated with: Japan or Ireland?

Answer: Ireland. St. Patrick is the patron saint and national apostle of Ireland.

9. What famous sisters recorded the song “Don’t Sit Under the Apple Tree (With Anyone Else but Me)”: the Dionne quintuplets or the Andrews Sisters?

Answer: The Andrews Sisters. The song was originally called “Anywhere the Bluebird Goes,” and the melody was an updated version of a 19th-century English folk song.

10. What nationality was Vincent van Gogh: Australian or Dutch?

Answer: Dutch. He was an expressionist painter famous for works like “Sunflowers,” “Starry Night,” and “Self-Portrait with Bandaged Ear.”

11. What is found in the middle of a Tootsie Pop: licorice or a Tootsie Roll?

Answer: Tootsie Roll. In the 1960s, a popular television ad campaign for the lollipop involved a young boy asking a wise owl how many licks it would take to get to the center of the Tootsie Pop.

12. Sacramento is the capital of what state: Alaska or California?

Answer: California. The California state legislature moved the capital to Sacramento in 1854.

13. What is the German word *delicatessen* often abbreviated to: *tessen* or *deli*?

Answer: Deli. Amusingly, this is not an original German word. The Germans borrowed the French word *délicatesse*, which means “delicious things,” and made it their own.

14. Was Bill “Bojangles” Robinson best-known for being a very talented writer or dancer?

Answer: Dancer. He was a beloved tap dancer who started as a vaudeville performer before moving on to Broadway and a successful film career in the 1930s and '40s.

15. What product is the Crayola company known for: Q-tips or crayons?

Answer: Crayons. The first crayons were made of paraffin wax and non-toxic pigments to create safe, sturdy, and affordable coloring sticks for children in 1903.

16. When it is drizzling, is there a lot of rain or a little?

Answer: A little. **Fun fact:** Rain that is considered a drizzle generally has drops between 0.008 and 0.02 inches in diameter. Any smaller and it would be considered fog.
