1. What salty body of water is located in the Middle East?

Answer: The Dead Sea. It is so named because it is so salty that nothing can survive.

2. What U.S. president had a sign on his desk that said, "The buck stops here"?

Answer: Harry S. Truman. Fred M. Canfil, U.S. Marshall and friend of Truman, had the sign made for Truman as a gift. "I'm from Missouri" is on the reverse side. It is currently on display at the Harry S. Truman Library and Museum.

3. What rare swan nests in Alberta, Canada? **Hint:** Its call sounds like a brass instrument, hence the name.

Answer: Trumpeter swan. It is the largest waterfowl in North America.

4. What cabbage dish is frequently served with hot dogs?

Answer: Sauerkraut. Sauerkraut means "sour cabbage" in German.

5. What type of fruit are morello, Royal Ann, and Bing?

Answer: Cherries. Cherries are categorized into two categories: sweet and sour. Sour cherries are mostly used in pies. Morello is a sour cherry. Royal Ann and Bing are sweet cherries.

Answer: The Scarlet Letter. The scarlet A stands for adulteress. Hester becomes pregnant as a result of the dalliance. The baby is named Pearl. The community shuns her also.

11. What instrument did Buddy Rich play?

Answer: The drums. Rich first played the drums in vaudeville at the age of 18 months. He is touted as being the greatest drummer of all time.

Answer: Nova Scotia. The famous Peggy's Point Lighthouse is located at Peggy's Cove.

15. Which "colorful" Ivy League school is located in Providence, Rhode Island?

Answer: Brown. Founded in 1764, it is the seventh-oldest college in the United States.

16. What French oceanographer invented the Aqua-Lung?

Answer: Jacques Cousteau. The Aqua-Lung was the first commercialized self-contained underwater breathing apparatus (SCUBA).

17. What Austrian composer is famous for the symphony he didn't finish?

Answer: Franz Schubert. The actual title of it is Symphony No. 8 in B minor, but it is commonly known as the *Unfinished Symphony*. Schubert began it in 1822 but did not complete it despite living for another six years.

18. What is the name of the ancient arena in Rome?

Answer: The Colosseum. It was originally known as the Flavian Amphitheatre. It could accommodate 50,000 spectators.

19. Who wrote the classic novel Oliver Twist?

Answer: Charles Dickens. The book is subtitled *The Parish Boy's Progress*. It was Dickens' second novel; it was published in 1838.

20. What actor starred as Nick Charles in The Thin Man series of films?

Answer: William Powell. He was paired up with Myrna Loy in seven of the films.

21. What is the largest city in France?

Answer: Paris. Marseille is the second largest. Lyon is the third.

22. What is the only planet not named for a mythological figure?

Answer: Earth. The other planets are named for Greek and Roman gods and goddesses. The word *earth* means "the ground."
