(Questions with Answers)

1. What is one of the two provinces located on the Atlantic coast of Canada?

Answer: Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. British Columbia is the only province on the Pacific coast.

2. In what battle was Napoleon finally defeated?

Answer: Waterloo. In 1815, a combined English and Prussian force defeated Napoleon outside the town of Waterloo. He would spend the rest of his days in exile.

3. What nursery rhyme character "kissed the girls and made them cry"?

Answer: Georgie Porgie. Origins of the rhyme date back to the mid-19th century in England.

4. What is the name of Batman's sidekick?

Answer: Robin. He was first introduced in 1940 to attract a younger readership. The ploy worked because sales increased dramatically following the debut of the Boy Wonder.

5. What Andrew Lloyd Webber musical features the song "The Music of the Night"?

Answer: *Phantom of the Opera*. The musical is based on the novel by French author Gaston Leroux. Two films have been adapted from the novel as well. The first one was a silent film starring Lon Chaney.

6. What tennis player holds the men's record for the most Grand Slam singles titles?

Answer: Novak Djokovic. He has 24 Grand Slam titles. Rafael Nadal has 22. However, Margaret Court holds the women's record with 24.

Answer: 1930s. Charles Lindbergh Jr. was taken from his bedroom and murdered in 1932. Bruno Hauptmann was convicted of the crime and executed in 1936.

14. What musician is known as the "King of the Blues"? (**Hint:** He is called B.B.)

Answer: B.B. King. He is known for his fluid guitar playing. He is ranked No. 6 on *Rolling Stone's* list of 100 greatest guitarists of all time.

15. What is the largest planet?

Answer: Jupiter. Planets in order from largest to smallest are Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, Earth, Venus, Mars, and Mercury. Pluto is no longer considered a planet.

16. What is the name of the physicist who made important discoveries about the atom?

Answer: Enrico Fermi. Fermi's ideas led to the splitting of the atom and the discovery of nuclear energy.

17. How do you say "enjoy your meal" in French?

Answer: Bon appétit.

18. What type of instrument is mentioned in the song "Oh! Susanna"?

Answer: Banjo. Stephen Foster wrote "Oh! Susanna" in 1846. A banjo is mentioned in the lyric "For I come from Alabama with a banjo on my knee."

Answer: Sack. Sacking the quarterback is a goal of the pass rusher.

20. Alphabetically, what country falls between Aruba and Austria? **Answer:** Australia. It is the only country that is also a continent.

21. What is the term for a mass of snow falling rapidly down a mountainside? **Answer:** Avalanche. Another term for an avalanche is a *snowslip* or *snowslide*. Slides of rock and debris falling the same way are also called an avalanche or a rockslide.

Answer: Dr. Seuss. His real name was Theodor Geisel. Seuss wrote more than 60 children's books.
