1. Which is larger: an adult black bear or an adult moose?

Answer: Moose. An adult bull moose can be larger than some adult grizzly bears.

2. What country is professional golfer Ernie Els from?

Answer: South Africa. When not playing golf, he operates a winemaking business and a golf course design business.

3. What is the occupation of the seven dwarves in *Snow White*?

Answer: Miners. "Snow White" was first published in *Grimms' Fairy Tales* in 1812. It is one of the most well-known fairy tales in the world. The dwarves were given names for the first time when the story was adapted into a play in 1912. Then Walt Disney changed the dwarves' names when he made the animated version in 1937.

4. What is the main ingredient in hummus?

Answer: Chickpeas. The word *hummus* is Arabic in origin and means "chickpeas."

5. Is Cape Spear the easternmost point or westernmost point of North America?

Answer: Easternmost point. It is located in Newfoundland.

6. What does the yellow flag signify in auto racing?

Answer: Andrew Lloyd Webber. The British composer is known for his success in London's West End and New York's Broadway. Many of his musicals, including *Cats*, *The Phantom of the Opera*, *Starlight Express*, and *Jesus Christ Superstar*, became international sensations.

8. What word is both a sound that a duck makes and an untrained person who pretends to be a doctor?

Answer: Quack

9. What is another name for a goose's or a duck's beak?

Answer: A bill. The words are synonymous, though *bill* is usually used to describe a flat structure like that of a duck or goose, while *beak* is more often used to describe birds with hooked structures, like raptors.

10. What kind of fungus has a poisonous variety called "death cap"?

Answer: Mushroom. Death caps are found throughout Europe. This variety looks very similar to nonpoisonous varieties (Caesar mushroom and straw mushrooms) and is sometimes accidentally consumed.

11. What is the function of white blood cells?

Answer: To protect the human body from infectious diseases and foreign bodies. An elevated white blood cell count means that the body is fighting an infection.

12. What country was formed when Tanganyika and Zanzibar were united?

Answer: Tanzania. The East African country was born in 1964.

13. What professional sport did Joe Namath play?

Answer: Football. Namath was a quarterback for the New York Jets and the Los Angeles Rams.

14. Who wrote *The Lord of the Rings*?

Answer: J.R.R. Tolkien. It is the sequel to *The Hobbit*. Both have been made into successful films.

15. What do the Roman numerals *MMCL* mean?

Answer: 2,150. *MM* equals two thousand. *C* equals one hundred. *L* is 50.

16. Which pole was explorer Roald Amundsen the first to reach?

Answer: South Pole. Rear Admiral Robert Peary was the first to reach the North Pole.

17. In what decade did the fall of the Berlin Wall occur?

Answer: 1980s. The East German government announced that people could cross into West Germany and West Berlin on November 9, 1989. The fall of the Berlin Wall was the first step toward German reunification.

18. Alphabetically, what country falls between Honduras and Hungary?

Answer: Hong Kong. Hong Kong is located on the south coast of China. It is one of the world's leading industrial centers.
